All students have been participating in G.E.L. (Guidance, Enrichment, & Leadership) lessons, once per cycle, that highlight Stony Brook's commitment to a positive and inclusive school environment. During this time, students participate in activities that focus on character education, social/emotional learning, and service learning. Topics discussed include making/keeping friends, respecting differences, conflict resolution skills, making positive choices, and self-awareness.

In order to prepare the students for working cooperatively to complete their projects, we also focused on interpersonal skills and collaboration strategies.

In this project, students were excited to tell stories and discover more about the world they know best: local community. This project provided rich opportunities for students to be photographers, interviewers, authors, journalists, explorers, anthropologists, sociologists, and documentarians. Throughout this experience, student learning was engaging, authentic, and relevant. Students had the opportunity to further develop their 21st century skills through communication, collaboration, creativity, and critical thinking. To carry out the project, students determined the angle and theme for their project and pitched their ideas. Culminating products included interviews with community members, models, photographs, board games. Students also integrated technology in the form of videos and slide shows. Throughout this process, the students built their intrinsic motivation and thrived in a learning environment where they could take educational risks.




